1.0 Introduction

The BSA National Jamboree is a gathering of thousands of members of the Boy Scouts of America, usually held every four years and organized by the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

Referred to as “the Jamboree”, “Jambo”, or NSJ, scouts from all over the nation and world can attend. It is considered one of several unique experiences the Boy Scouts of America offers. The first jamboree was scheduled to be held in 1935 in Washington, D.C. to celebrate the 25th anniversary of Scouting, but was delayed two years after being cancelled due to a polio outbreak. The 1937 jamboree in Washington attracted 25,000 Scouts, who camped around the Washington Monument and Tidal Basin.

2.0 BAC Contingent

The contingent is comprised of scouts from troops and crews from all over Bay Area Council, forming two specific units for purposes of National Jamboree. These are Troop 4341, with four adult leads and 36 scout participants, and Crew 4432, with 21 adult and scout participants. The tables below show the contingent youth and adult leadership.

Service & Impact Project

3.3 Jambo Activities description

Better World (Lead: Denise Andrews)

Supporting the World Organization of Scouting Movement's commitment to the United Nation's 17 Sustainable Development Goals, Scouts will be able to explore, learn about, engage in dialogue about, and brainstorm solutions to make a better world. Experts from local, national, and global non-profits and NGOs, universities, social organizations, and businesses will visit the Jamboree to help Scouts learn about issues that impact their world both at home and away.

Location: Summit Center & Satellite Locations

Challenge Base Camp (Lead: Tom Wells)

Scouts will be physically, experientially, and emotionally challenged as they participate in activities from the era of America's frontier to modern-day games. Whether at the Buckskin games, Color Run Alley, or other awesome areas, fun and learning is the name of the game. Challenge Base Camp includes these programmatic areas:

- Buckskin Games (frontier activities)
- Color Run Alley (paint ball accuracy course)
- Disc Golf courses (short and long distances for all skill levels)
- First Scout Camp representation area
- Pioneering (using ropes and wooden spars to build awesome things)
- Titan Trail (the Summit's premier obstacle course and race challenge)

Hometown Celebration (Lead: Morgan Passiment)

Hometown Celebration is a special time at the Jamboree (Sunday afternoon, July 23) when units, groups, and individuals will share special elements of their hometown (or home area as some councils encompass large geographies) cultures, heritages, histories, and more. There are no limits to the creativity Scouts will see as they visit different unit campsites: units will be telling stories, put on skits, sharing favorite hometown foods or items, teaching people how to make a hometown craft, playing games that highlight their community, and more! This event is a way to share with others what we each hold special and to help Scouts practice curiosity, inclusion, and belonging.

Leadership Heights (Lead: Gary Schroeder)

Jamboree Adventure (Lead: Mike Abrahamson)

The Summit Bechtel Reserve is the greatest adventure amusement location on the planet! For NSJ 23, the adventure offerings of SBR are revved-up for jamboree-level fun. Scouts are able to ride, paddle, shoot, and scale their way through some of the most thrilling activities they can imagine at a Scout Camp. All programs are available to all Scouts, though a few have minimum and maximum height/weight requirements (details available in the Jamboree app). Service & Impact (Lead: Russell Smart)

When the BSA and West Virginia agreed to build the Summit Bechtel Reserve, one of Scouting's commitments was that our Jamborees will always contribute meaningful service to West Virginia and the Appalachia region. Each unit will be scheduled to participate in an onsite service project that will make a significant difference to families across Appalachia. The challenges of storms and flooding wreak havoc on homes and families each year, and the devastation to property and people's lives is staggering. Our service at NSJ will be organized to help families have some of the tools and elements to make clean-up from these storms a little easier.

Location: Bottom of the Arena in Summit Center

Operation Arrow (Lead: Clint Takeshita)

The Order of the Arrow (OA) is providing a significant contribution to the National Scout Jamboree, all the way from those leading the Jamboree to the offerings that will most profoundly impact Scouts. Operation Arrow is made up of two elements. First, the OA Service Corps continues a tradition of service to the National Scout Jamboree which began in 1950. Essential to the operation of a Jamboree, more than 100 Order members group into chapters and provide support to all aspects of the Jamboree program, logistics, and operations.

The second element of Operation Arrow is Summit Apex. Summit Apex is a Jamboree 'outpost' program that will inspire Scouts to truly realize and deeply appreciate the benefits of their participation in Scouting. Scouts will engage in large-scale activities intended to catalyze the spirit of Scouting across the country, enjoy a one-of-a-kind Jamboree dinner, and experience an evening of reflection, inspiration, celebration, and merriment. Scouts will leave the Summit Apex with a renewed enthusiasm for Scouting and a determination to grow membership back home.

Location: Base Camp Echo

Religious Celebrations & Worship Service

The participating faith groups will be centered in the Duty to God & Country program area (located in Summit Center). Chaplains and faith representatives will be available through that area and/or throughout the Base Camps and Sub Camps. Religious services will be organized by individual faith leaders and scheduled appropriately each day of the Jamboree. Locations for daily observances will be in special areas of the Duty to God & Country program area, while large gathering Sunday observances will be announced at the jamboree (note: all locations are subject to change).

Frontier Quest (Lead: Andrew Miller)

'Forward' is the theme of NSJ 2023, and Frontier Quest aims to help Scouts see into the future, gain skills and perspectives to help them thrive in the world to come, and to be 'prepared for life' as family members, community leaders, and leaders of organizations, businesses, and civic engagements. Scouts will explore the world of STEM and sustainability, their duties as citizens, the science and art of conservation, nature, and coexisting with all that is a part of this earth, as well as their duty to country and their faith. - Disability Awareness & Challenge area
- Duty to God & Country

- Selected Hobbies & Careers (Merit Badges)
- STEM

Jamboree Events (Lead: David Kehrer)

With the theme 'Forward,' the Jamboree has reimagined how to provide Scouts an opportunity to celebrate and enjoy the vibrant energy of the spirit of Scouting on display. Scouts will never forget what they experience together through the many evening-time Base Camp bashes!

Jamboree Jubilee (Lead: Clark Quackenbush)

Jamboree is about fun, and the Summit Bechtel Reserve is about adventure. STATEMENT OF UNDERSTANDING + CODE OF CONDUCT

Statement of Understanding

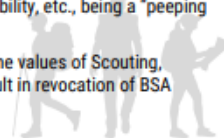
All participants (youth and leaders) are selected to represent their local councils based on qualifications in character, camping skills, physical and personal fitness, and leadership qualities. Therefore, all adult and youth participants and their parents or guardians are asked to read the Code of Conduct and Statement of Understanding as a condition of participation.

It is with the further understanding that serious misconduct or infraction of rules and regulations may result in expulsion (at the participant's own expense) from the jamboree or during the jamboree tour. Each participant is responsible for his or her own behavior, and only when necessary, will the procedure be invoked to send a participant home from the jamboree.

Code of Conduct

The unit's adult leaders are responsible for the supervision of its membership, maintaining discipline, security, and the Jamboree Code of Conduct. Leaders will be guided by the Scout Oath and Scout Law and will obey all U.S., local, and state laws.

- I promise to obey the Scout oath and law.
- I will be Scout-like in how we act and treat others.
- I will set a good example by keeping myself neatly dressed and presentable.
- I will attend all scheduled programs and participate as required in cooperation with other unit members and leaders.
- In consideration of other unit participants, I agree to follow the bedtime and sleep schedule of the unit.
- I will be responsible for keeping my tent and personal gear clean and neat and labeling all personal gear.
- I will adhere to all recycling policies and regulations. I will not litter.
- I understand that the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages or illegal drugs is prohibited at The Summit.
- I understand that serious and/or repetitive behavior violations, including cheating, stealing, dishonesty, fighting, and cursing, may result in expulsion from The Summit or serious disciplinary action and loss of privileges.
- I understand that gambling of any form is prohibited.
- I understand that possession of lasers of any type and possession or detonation of fireworks is prohibited.
- I will demonstrate respect for The Summit and unit property and be personally responsible for any loss, breakage, or vandalism of property as a result of my actions.
- Neither the unit leaders nor the Boy Scouts of America will be responsible for the loss, breakage, or theft of personal items. I will label all my personal items and check items of value at the direction of unit leaders. Theft will be grounds for expulsion.
- I will obey the safety rules and instructions of all supervisors and staff members.
- I understand that hazing has no place in Scouting; nor do running the gauntlet, belt lines, and similar acts of physical punishment.
- I understand that participants may only bring items specified on the equipment list provided.
- I understand that I can be sent home for bullying, cyberbullying, horseplay, fighting, stealing, off-color jokes, remarks or conduct, harassment of any kind – sexual, religious, race, cultural, national origin, disability, etc., being a "peeping tom", being in an off-limits area and/or repeated failure to follow instructions.
- Violation of this Code of Conduct, or any other conduct deemed to be inconsistent with the values of Scouting, may result in expulsion from The Summit at the participant's own expense and could result in revocation of BSA membership.

4.2 Medical

Each participant (adult or youth) should bring sufficient medications to last the entirety of the trips (July 15 -30). All routine medications should be self-administered under the supervision of adult unit leadership.

All medication is the responsibility of the individual taking the medication and/or that individual's parent/guardian.

Prescription medication needs to be in a clear Ziploc bag with the scout's name on it. The medication and dosing instructions should be clearly labeled and only contain as much medication as is needed for the week. Please do not send the full contents. The ASM will document a schedule and provide each scout with their medicine per the schedule.

ASMs will encourage the scouts to practice daily hygiene and ensure the scouts are well hydrated. All scouts will be reminded of the signs and symptoms of heat stress/injury and immediate reaction if they suspect someone is sick.

4.4 Weather


Day temperatures are expected to be in the mid to low 80's so hydration is critical especially with the added physical exertion. During the evenings, temperatures are averaged in the mid 60's demanding the need for a light jacket. Further, ensure your scout has light rain gear (like a poncho).

4.5 Spending money

Spending money should be a family discussion with the scouts. The registration fees will cover three meals per day during travel and at Jamboree. Spending on souvenirs and snacks during travel and at Jambo should be a decision between the scout and his/her parents/guardians. Additionally, the Jambo fees do not include "things to do" at Pigeon Forge downtown (e.g., [SpeedZone fun park](#)).

5.1 What else to bring

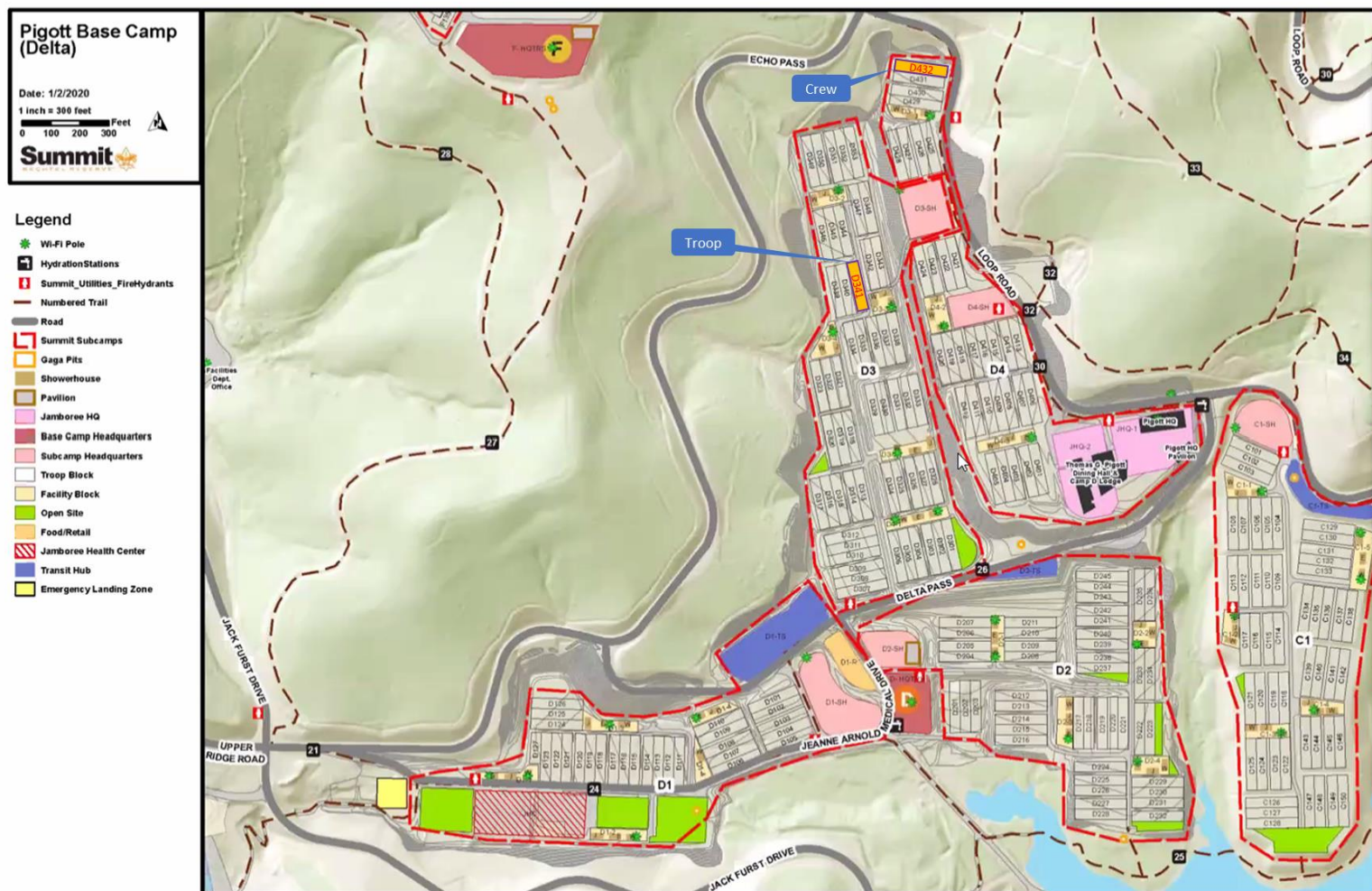

6.0 Merit badges

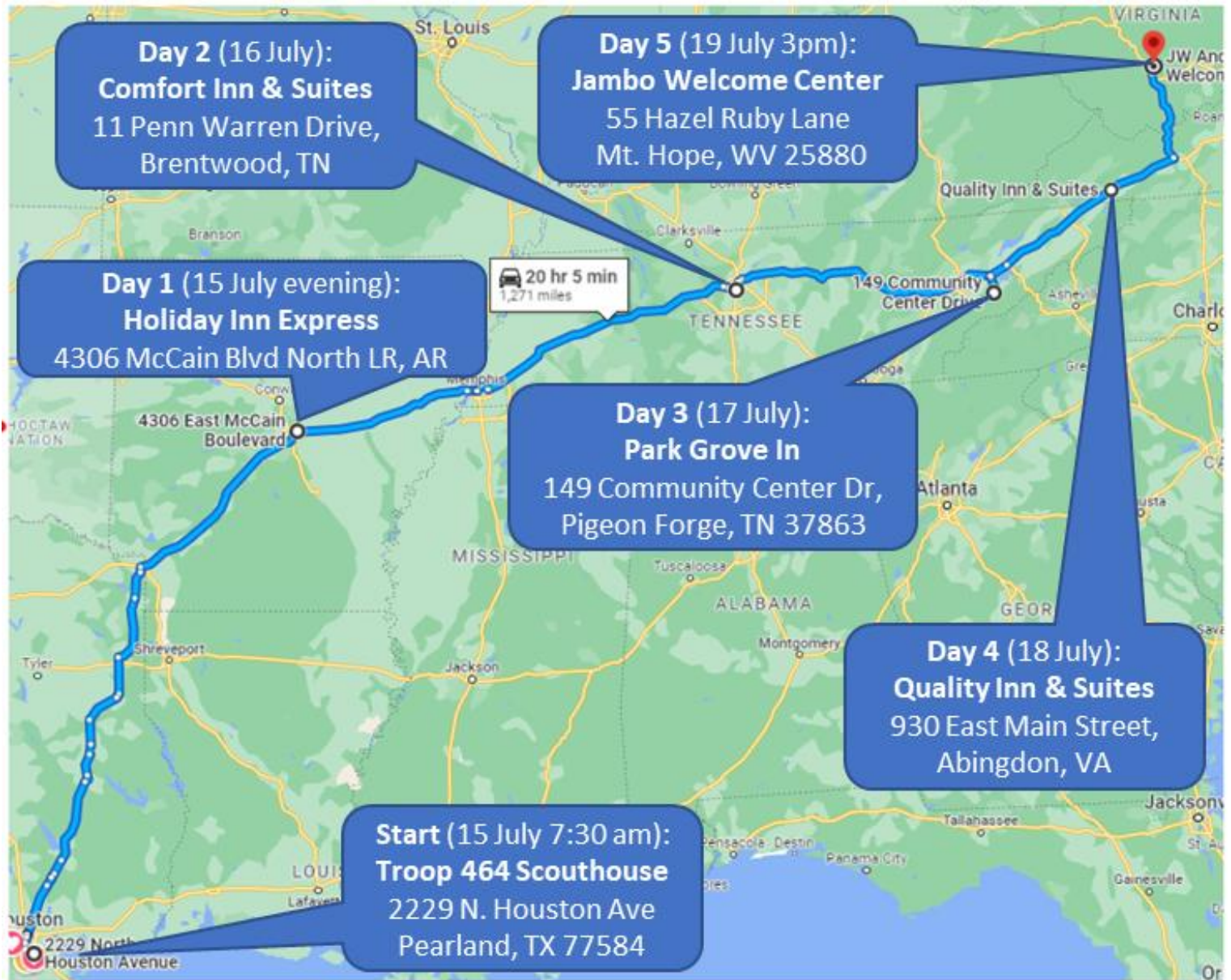
